Life After a Mission Trip

An excerpt from an e-mail written to our Thailand Discovery Team From Angela Sudermann the Volunteer Coordinator in Global Missions for American Baptist Ministries

Dear team,

Isn't coming back to the USA an interesting experience? There is so much to think about, and feel, and try to understand. You came back to your homes with a different mind and heart. Your friends, family, neighbors are still the same people you left, but you have changed. Your world-view has expanded, you've seen some things most of the US hasn't and won't ever experience. How do you make sense of it all??

When I came back from my first trip to Thailand, which was also my first mission trip, I was a mess. I wanted to give most of my "stuff" away because I had so much and the people in Thailand had so little. I felt very guilty about having so many material goods, and even being born in the USA.

You may find yourself depressed, withdrawn, frustrated, irritated, and emotional right now. It is all normal, but you will need to work through your feelings and frustrations. Believe me, I did everything wrong.

I was frustrated with my church family because they did not have the passion I did. How could they? They had not been there to experience what I had. I was frustrated with my spouse who would come home from his desk job and complain about how hard his life was. He had running water from a faucet, food whenever he wanted, a stable society he lived in, no fear of the government, shelter, and a healthy family. What was hard? I forgot that our own situations can be hard depending on the place we are in life.

There is a lot more, but I encourage you all to talk with each other, laugh at the inside jokes you had, remember the hard things, the fun, the pain, the icky. Praise God for the experience and know he is leading you to a place of healing and strength.

Where do I begin- I ponder that question as I try to form words that will depict the stories, and experiences our team had in Thailand on our water project mission. There were many surprises, and many events that blew away my expectations for the trip. Yet if I could bring my thoughts into one capsule of a sermon I learned that seeing people through God's eyes changes your perspective on everything that was once ordinary.

For example, we went to the country with intentions to help hill-tribe people who do not have Thai citizenship and therefore are left to survive as subsistence farmers. With our goal to bring clean water and build sanitary restrooms we placed our hope in the holistic mission of ITDP (Integrated Tribal Development Program), which tries to change the source of the problem rather than dealing with the effects of the problem. Thailand and other east Asian countries have high drug uses and human trafficking problems. I believe we need ministries to help with the illegal substance producers and users, prostitutes, and slavery, but many of those ministries help fight the problem, not prevent it. ITDP has prevention in mind. With clean water and good health, villages can educate their children and become agriculturally productive with help from ITDP and churches like the Palouse Federated Church. It truly forms a beautiful harmony of God's greater body of believers working together for HIS work. Yet I cognitively refused to view my 2-week experience as an opportunity to merely help one village while I was there. I knew there must be something more to this trip than being a worker from a distant country. With this in mind, I really searched my heart and asked God why he had brought me to this place. As one person on our team said aloud "These villagers really don't need our help to build this water system" (because they were such strong and motivated workers) but they continued saying "so that means God must have brought us here for something greater than manual labor." Their words were very true, and they echoed the question in my heart of why did God bring me to this village.

So I searched my heart and asked God many questions: Is this experience of poverty supposed to compel me to change my lifestyle at home? Is the lack of education a void that I feel the burden to help fund financially? Should I help build connections between more churches and ITDP to allow new water projects and help more villages... As I asked these questions I didn't seem to hear any answers. I believe my motives were pure and God was pleased with my thoughts however, I believe His call was not about "doing more" but rather "seeing" more. Let me explain.

After being back in the states I've had time to reflect and process my trip and I believe the greatest lesson learned on our Thailand trip was that having the right perspective in life gives us hope and purpose. We went to the village expecting to see lost souls and people who needed Jesus as their savior. With this perspective we didn't dwell on their sinful drinking habits, or the amount of drugs used, and the witchcraft that was a part of their culture. We went with a goal to help them physically through building a clean water source, but ultimately we were bestowing on them a wonderful gift that represented grace. Our desire was for villagers to ask the question "Why would these people sacrifice their time and money to come help us?" Through that question ITDP is able to answer with the Good News of Jesus Christ and that we've all been given a sacrificial gift from God. This method worked because we viewed the villagers as real people with real needs, we didn't define them by their previous mistakes or the choices they make. We recognized that we had something to offer, not of our selves, but through God's Spirit and direction.

Bringing that perspective home is what challenged me most. Mother Teresa who served the extremely poor in Calcutta, once shared that Calcutta's are everywhere if only we have the eyes to see them. She was sharing the theme that when we see people the way God sees people, then we feel compassion and love toward them like the shepherd to the lost sheep. I realized that the mission in Thailand taught me a lesson on perspective, but it truly gave me a heart for His people back here in the states. And I believe the mission in America is much harder than the mission in Thailand. The villagers see their need for God, for a savior. They cling to Christ because he truly becomes their identity. However in our culture we have so many idols, distractions and busy schedules that our culture sees little need for a savior and we have no room for Jesus in our day. That is why we need to pray daily for God's Spirit to help us see with HIS eyes. We will see our self rightly, and we will have a new perspective of our co-workers, our family, our neighbors who live across the street and we'll see the ordinary as opportunities for extraordinary hope and grace.

I want to thank the congregation of Palouse Federated Church for the support and investment made into our Thailand trip. We were only able to go and to experience God's blessings so greatly because of your gifts and your prayers. However now we want you to take ownership not only in the blessing of project, but the glorious burden of the mission. God gave us new eyes in Thailand, and we hope to share the lesson learned. Our Lord loves the drunks, the drug users, the spiritually lost and confused here in Palouse, just like the ones in the Huay Mak Nung Village in northern Thailand. So as a church let us pray continually and cling to faith- *"And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him."* – Hebrews 11:6

Sabbatical Update

As reported in previous newsletters, Pastor Corey and his family will be on a sabbatical from mid-June to mid-August 2012. We heard from several of you at an open meeting on Feb. 12 (see March newsletter for report on that meeting). Plans to address the needs of the congregation during the sabbatical have been moving forward. Below is a list of those efforts--the things that have happened since the February meeting.

- Pastor Mark is choosing to remain with his same duties and responsibilities during the sabbatical. With a baby on the way, as well as farm and other work to do, he feels it would be best to hire a fill-in pastor rather than try to fill that role himself.
- Efforts to identify fill-in pastors from other denominations, outside of American Baptist, were not successful.
- Some good leads for a fill-in pastor have been identified. These are within the American Baptist denomination. Hiring of a fill-in pastor will not be at any additional cost to the church. That is, this hire will utilize the savings from a decreased salary to Pastor Corey during his sabbatical. The fill-in pastor would be offered the parsonage as housing during the sabbatical. This housing would be considered as part of the compensation.
- In the next two months, Pastor Corey will be meeting with anyone who is interested in helping out the church in extra ways during the sabbatical. Be sure to let him know if are interested. It is an exciting opportunity for personal spiritual growth for those who serve in this way.
- During the sabbatical, an element called "Our Faith Stories" will be added to Sunday worship times. Each week a different layperson from PFC will share his/her journey with Christ. If you feel called to share your faith story, be sure to let Pastor Corey or the Pastoral Relations Committee know. Sermons will still be preached during worship as well.
- A Visitation Ministry training is being planned to occur before the sabbatical. The aim is to increase the number of trained visitation ministers available to provide visits and care for people of our church and community. (See the article in this newsletter about the visitation ministry.) This increased number of visiting ministers will be important during the sabbatical, but also represents an important ongoing ministry of PFC. If you wish to participate in that training, notify Pastor Corey or the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- Look for another "town hall" style meeting in the weeks just prior to the sabbatical beginning. At this meeting you can hear about the final details that have been worked out. You can also bring your questions about how things will work and find out how you can assist. The meeting time and date will be announced in the bulletin, in worship services and in the newsletter in the coming weeks.

The Pastoral Relations committee thanks those of you who have offered questions, concerns and suggestions for a successful sabbatical experience for the church. Thanks also to those who have been in prayer for this process and for a highly successful time of rest and reinvigoration for Pastor Corey and his family. We remain excited about the opportunities for spiritual growth and development for our congregation and our pastor and family. Bible 101

Do you want to read the Bible but find it a little intimidating? Maybe you've been reading the Bible for years but you have some questions about how it was written? Pastor Corey has put together a class just for you. We will be offering **Bible 101 Thursday April 26th 6-8pm**. It is a wonderful introduction to God's Word. Everyone who attends this class will be given a free gift. If you are interested in attending please let Pastor Corey know or check the box on your weekly communication card.

Bible Reading Plan: ~ by Pastor Corey

This year we are going to have a goal of reading the whole Bible through in one-year. There are many different ways to achieve this goal. The April schedule mapped out below is a chronological schedule. The intent is to read the Bible in the actual order that it “unfolded.” If you want to do something different than chronological, consider going to: <http://www.bibleplan.org> and take advantage of the many different free plans they offer on that website. If you don’t do internet, consider simply doing this: read 2 chapters of the New Testament a day, and 2 chapters of the Old Testament a day. When you finish the New Testament (which will be much sooner than you finish the Old Testament) consider shifting your 2 chapters of reading over to the Old Testament- OR- read 2 chapters of the Gospels each day. Either way you will more than read the whole Bible in a year if you read 4 chapters of scripture each day. There are 929 chapters in the 66 book Bible, so you can get away with reading 3 chapters a day- but reading 4 will help you keep pace and will help you personalize and read areas twice that are especially helpful for you.

Frequently Asked Questions:

“Pastor, I am reading the Old Testament and the Gospels- what’s the deal with all the ‘duplication’ of stories, names and such?” Good question. The Bible is a complex historical document. We believe it is living truth and inspired by God’s Spirit. It is also a set of 66 books written by human hands. So some histories overlap. Some stories are told twice, or more, from different perspectives. The whole book of Deuteronomy is a “re-telling” of stories told previously. In fact Deuteronomy means “second telling” or “repeated telling.” The Gospels are all biographies of Jesus Christ, but each by a different human author, from a different perspective. The unifying aspect of scripture is that the Holy Spirit is behind all of it.

“Pastor I have a hard time reading all those lists of places and lists of names in the Old Testament- what’s wrong with me?” Nothing’s wrong with you. That’s hard reading. The names of places, though sometimes boring to us, are important for charting the history and location of the Bible events. Try dealing with places by using a Bible Atlas or map that may be in your study Bible or in the back of your Bible. This helps to give a visual of where the story is taking place. Lists of names and tribes appear over and over and over again in the Old Testament. It is mostly okay to scan these lists. But don’t scan too fast. Tucked in there are sometimes short little stories, like the story of the Prayer of Jabez tucked away in the midst of a list in 1 Chronicles chapter 4.
