Pastor's Column:

"Respectable Sins" - Is there such a thing?

Up until we celebrate Christ's resurrection we will be having Sunday morning sermons and Wednesday evening messages (Soup and bread dinner at 6pm, Message at 6:30pm) on the topic of "Respectable Sins." The series is based off a book by author Jerry Bridges.

The sermons will be straight from the scripture, and the aim is to cut through all the ways we justify having sin in our life.

One pattern of humans is to always demonize a sin that "other people" do as a gross and more terrible sin than the one they particularly struggle with. Our sins are the sins that Bridges says we humans deem "respectable," though in truth there is no such thing as a respectable sin.

Ungodliness, pride, discontentment, laziness, greed, selfishness, irritability, rash decision making, among others are not sins that God winks at as acceptable.

ALL sins are deplorable to God.

ALL sins are signs of the death in this world and our separation from God and need of salvation.

ALL sins need to be confessed to God, forgiven out of His mercy, while we strive to work against them.

I know sin isn't a likely favorite topic of many, but it is of great importance. If we ignore sin in our own life, you can guarantee that in some way we will pay for it. Sin is weight that bears down us, whether we know it or not.

I encourage you to attend throughout Lent as much as possible and contribute to the conversation and learning by interacting with the message via the communication cards, email, phone calls or in person.

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Books Your Pastor is Reading

One aspect of my calling is to be continually learning. A pastor should strive to be a decent theologian in order to address the questions, ideas and issues that congregants might have. I must be learning if I want the congregation to have spiritual growth and learning. So I thought it appropriate to give you an inside look at some of the books* I have read lately, with a brief bit of info on each. Some I have completed, some I read a piece at a time for encouragement or challenge, and some are simply ongoing reads.

- "Simplicity in Preaching" by J.C. Ryle- A quick read from the 19th century on how to preach in a direct, understandable manner.
- "D. Martyn Lloyd-Jones: The First Forty Years" by Iain H. Murray- An encouraging biography of a young Welsh doctor called to preach, who is used by God mightily in rural Wales and beyond.
- "A Sketch of the Life and Labors of George Whitefield" by J.C. Ryle- A very brief biography of one of the key preachers of the First Great Awakening in the 1700's.
- "Of the Mortification of Sin in Believers..." by John Owen- A great work about true, personal holiness by one of the best Puritan theologians of the 1600's. This is a hard read, but worth it!
- "Amazing Grace: God's Pursuit, Our Response"- by Timothy George- A theological and historical book from a Baptist perspective that deals with questions around salvation, predestination and grace.
- "The Life and Diary of David Brainerd"- Brainerd was a pastor and missionary to Native Americans in the 1600's, his personal reflections are very challenging .
- "Maestro: A Surprising Story about Leading by Listening" by Roger Nierenberg- A quick read about leadership in story form that is surprisingly deep and helpful.
- "Making Friends, Making Disciples"- by Lee Spitzer- A good book for Christian leaders on the nature of friendship and how it relates to the health and growth of a church.

*note- I have made a big switch to read most books via Kindle, thanks to a surprise Christmas gift from my wife.

PFC Summer 2012: "Doing Church" During Pastor's Sabbatical 3

A congregational discussion of the Pastor's summer 2012 sabbatical was hosted by the Pastoral Relations Committee on Sunday February 12th. Twelve people, including Pastor Corey and Tina, attended. The meeting began shortly after 3 PM in the Fellowship Hall with prayer.

Corey briefly described his plans for rest, retooling, and reflection during the 8-week period of family Laughary's absence (mid-June through mid-August). He also explained that two of the eight weeks will be designated as part of their previously allotted annual leave. The remaining six weeks will be compensated at a reduced rate.

The group then launched into an hour-long, loosely structured discussion of opportunities associated with maintaining vibrant worship and pastoral care through this period. Following are key points.

There was strong consensus that continuity is important. It is important to "get out the word" (print, flyers, e-media) that "church is not shutting down for the summer" and in fact will be an exciting place to be and to worship. It would seem that maintaining all three services is desirable. There was strong agreement that experienced pastoral leadership should be available for weddings, baptisms, funerals, etc. and spiritual counsel. A list of "who-to-call-for-what" should be made, circulated, and properly published within the congregation, as a method of planning for the handling of routine and not-so-routine issues.

There was also strong consensus that the sabbatical period offers exciting opportunities in two general areas.

First, the group was excited about possibilities for vigorous lay involvement in worship leading, preaching, and pastoral care via our visitation ministry. Lay worship leaders and preachers could be recruited for a series of Sundays, perhaps exploring a selected theme, for a part of the summer. Lay preachers could be engaged for a short sequence of Sundays. Lay leadership could complement professional leadership of worship. The visitation ministry has new volunteers and that ministry will be re-invigorated for the summer.

Second, there was strong interest in meeting the need for experienced pastoral leadership by bringing an interim or retired pastor to PFC during the summer. This person could provide counsel and perspective to the lay leaders and to Mark Sawyer in his ongoing, and perhaps expanded, role as Associate Pastor. This person might have background in an area of interest to our congregation. Such a leader could come from a denomination other than American Baptist, and given the broad range of backgrounds within PFC, the group was interested in this option as a way to explore other faith perspectives.

The group advocates three action items to push ahead in planning for the summer, all to be pursued in parallel: 1) explore within the congregation for people interesting in preaching and leading worship during the summer; 2) put out feelers seeking experienced pastoral leadership to reside at PFC during the summer; 3) talk with Mark Sawyer about his plans and aspirations as Associate Pastor during the sabbatical.

The meeting concluded with prayer at about 4:20 PM.

This spring break, Taylor White will be going to Zacapa, Guatemala with Hearts in Motion (HIM), a program that focuses on the medical, educational, and welfare related needs of impoverished areas. Consider Consistent Contributions ~ Pastor Corey

Q: Why should I budget to give consistently to the church?

A: There are a number of ways to answer this question. The answers fall into two categories, personal and community. The personal reasons to budget to give to a church are simple. First it is an act of personal obedience to God, to give back to God in regular way, out of all that God gives to you. Secondly- though it should not be your primary purpose of giving, it feels good to give! Thirdly people who budget to give and do so in a consistent, regular way find that they gain more personal control and discipline in their finances. Why? If you begin to see your financial life as part of your spiritual life, you will treat it as something that deserves discipline and planning, not something that should be haphazard.

The community reasons for giving are also pretty straight forward. Your contributions allow the church to have pastors that are resources for the church and community in faith, prayer, counseling, youth and learning. You also are supporting the upkeep and improvement of a facility that is used for worship, learning, community activities, funerals and much more. Also together our contributions help to support missionaries around the world, chaplains in our county and in prisons, Sunday school material for our children, and much more.

God gives a local church enough resources to do the mission that God calls that local church to do. If you believe in the mission of our local church, that we are worshiping God and forming one another into loving servants of Christ and the world- than we welcome your gifts to help support our shared work.

Lent Bible Reading Challenge

Pastor Corey has challenged the whole Palouse Federated Church community to follow the advice of God's voice from heaven in Mark 9:7. In that verse the voice of God says about Jesus, "This is my son, whom I love. Listen to Him!" So **we are going to seek to "Listen to Jesus Christ" by each of us reading at least one of the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke or John) before Resurrection Sunday.** No reading schedule will be offered- simply read at your own pace, and practice listening as you read.

Q: How do you listen as you read scripture?

A: Read a section of scripture, it doesn't have to be too long. Ask yourself "What is happening in these verses?" After answering that question, and it may help to write down your thoughts, then ask yourself, "What teaching or lesson is in these verses?" and then the personal follow up, "How do these teachings or lessons apply to my life?" and "How could I live differently today because I have read and learned from this scripture?"

Q: Can I only read one Gospel? What if I finish early?

A: No- please always read as much as is profitable to your spiritual growth. Feel no compulsion to read fast. Instead read, think, listen and pray. If you do finish your first Gospel choice before Lent is over, consider reading the same Gospel again (and see what you learn differently the second time through) or pick another one.

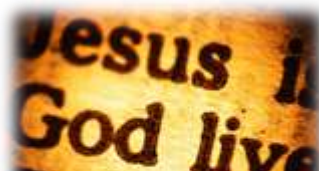

Bible Reading Plan: ~ by Pastor Corey

This year we are going to have a goal of reading the whole Bible through in one-year. There are many different ways do to achieve this goal. The March schedule mapped out below is a chronological schedule. The intent is to read the Bible in the actual order that it "unfolded." If you want to do something different than chronological, consider going to: <http://www.bibleplan.org> and take advantage of the many different free plans they offer on that website. If you don't do internet, consider simply doing this: read 2 chapters of the New Testament a day, and 2 chapters of the Old Testament a day. When you finish the New Testament (which will be much sooner than you finish the Old Testament) consider shifting your 2 chapters of reading over to the Old Testament- OR- read 2 chapters of the Gospels each day. Either way you will more than read the whole Bible in a year if you read 4 chapters of scripture each day. There are 929 chapters in the 66 book Bible, so you can get away with reading 3 chapters a day- but reading 4 will help you keep pace and will help you personalize and read areas twice that are especially helpful for you.

One Solitary Life

Born in an obscure village, He was the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another village, where He lived in poverty, was reared in obscurity, and worked in a carpenter shop until He was 30. Then for three years He was an itinerant preacher.

He never wrote a book. He never held an office. He never had a family or owned a house. He didn't go to college. He never visited a big city. He never traveled 200 miles from the place where He was born. He did none of the things one usually associates with greatness. He had no credentials but Himself.

He was only 33 when the tide of public opinion turned against Him. His friends ran away. He was turned over to His enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While He was dying His executioners gambled for His clothing, the only property He had on earth. When He died, He was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend. 20 centuries have come and gone and today He is the central figure of the human race and the leader of mankind's progress.

All the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the parliaments that ever sat, all the kings that ever reigned put together, have not affected the life of man on this earth as much as this

Solitary Life

Dear friends and family,

I wanted to let you know, February will be my last month interning at the mission! I am so appreciative for your financial and prayer support these last 10 months. I wish I could tell you all the things I've learned during my time at the mission, but there would be too many to tell you! I can tell you that I am definitely a different person since beginning the internship. This experience has been my own personal journey in following Jesus when He said **"Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. For whoever seeks to save their life will lose it and whoever loses their life for me will save it"**-Luke 9:23-24. The journey has been a wonderful yet extremely challenging experience. I have been insulted, cussed out and demeaned at times, and the only thing that kept me moving forward was the knowledge of Christ's love for these hurting people. I have also been thanked, hugged and built friendships with homeless guests. Some days I wanted to quit, at times I wanted to let everyone know how great it was to work in homeless ministry!

I currently have the opportunity to continue working with homeless women at a shelter through a different non-profit in Portland, which is why my internship will be ending. But I have no doubt that the Portland Rescue Mission was where God wanted me to go because He did something that I couldn't ever have dreamed up in life. Let me tell you!

After interning for a few months, a co-worker asked me if he could set me up on a blind date with his roommate (ironically, another employee at the Portland Rescue Mission who I had never met). I reluctantly agreed (as did he) and we went on a date. After a few dates in the first week, we began to realize our lives seemed to be meeting in an amazing way that could have only been written by one hand. As Brandyn and I talked about our hopes for our futures and our current passions, we found we both feel called to homeless ministry in Portland and possibly international mission work in the future. After our first week of dating I was so overwhelmed with the sense that this was the man God intended me to marry, I proceeded to cry to anyone and everyone around me for a few days and then pulled myself together! He is the most wonderful blessing God has given me besides forgiveness through His precious son Jesus. Brandyn is God's example of Christ's love, forgiveness and protection in my life and I feel so lucky to have him as part of my life! We got engaged a week ago and are planning to be married in June! When you know, you know, and you get married! We both KNOW!

If you told me that I would meet the man of my dreams and be getting married at the end of this internship I would have thought you were crazy, but that is why I can say, **"Now to Him who is able to do far more abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to His power that is at work within us, to Him be the glory in the church and in Jesus Christ to all generations forever and ever! Amen"**-Ephesians 3:20-21.
