Pastor's Column: Thanking One...

Have you heard of the concept of the "audience of One"? The idea is that we each are to live our life to impress the One that truly matters, God alone. By living to honor God, along the way we will find ourselves loving our family, neighbors, friends and yes even our enemies. Living to honor the One will also at times mean we have to disappoint people who may want us to do something that is not worthy of a life lived seeking to honor God above all else.

I want to take this concept of the "audience of One" and combine it with our November theme of "Thankfulness." This month we will be talking a lot about "Thanking One." We are going to be focusing on reasons that we should be thankful to God.

Along the way of this journey of thanking God for life, the people in our life, and the purposes in our life- we will be challenged to put thankfulness into action. So how do we put thankfulness into action? God has put people in your life that have meant a great deal to you. Let's consider these people:

"Life Savers"- We all have people in our life that we owe our very life to. Each of us parents (biological and/or adoptive), some of us have doctors or friends that have saved our life. Many of us have specific people that led us to have a life-saving faith in Jesus Christ. I challenge you to write a one-page letter of thanks to someone you owe your life to- and in so doing you are also thanking the One who put that person in your life. Even if the person is deceased you can still write this letter of thanks to them.

"Life Mates"- Some of us are blessed to share life with a spouse. The deep love and commitment we have for our spouse is often acknowledged, but seldom do many of us challenge ourselves to put it in written word. I challenge you to write a one-page letter of thanks to your life-mate. Even if the person is now deceased, I think this exercise can help you appreciate the love that God gave you to share with your mate.

"Life Gifts"- Some are blessed with the gift of the life of children. For some we are biological parents, some are adoptive parents, and others are mentors to children in their neighborhood or the church. Consider writing a one-page letter to the "Life Gift's" in your life- expressing to them the love you have for them, the potential you see in them, and the hope you have for them to follow God's path for their life.

"Life Sharers" - What would life be without that sibling, good friend, or neighbor that helps us out when we are in need? You know that person you can have a cup of coffee or tea with, and you feel like they have helped you carry your load when it was too much to carry. Why don't you write a one-page letter saying thank you, from your heart, for this person God has given to be a "life-sharer" with you.

Some of you may say: "But I am not a good writer." Well that's okay. The point is to simply write the truth from your heart. Saying the truth about what you appreciate and feel for this person in your life. It doesn't have to be fancy or perfect.

This November let's not just talk about thankfulness- let's practice thankfulness. The Harvest Dinner this year will have an opportunity for you to invite the recipients of your letter for you to gift it to them. I encourage you to wrap it, frame it, or put it in a box.

Will you join me in the "Thank One" campaign- by writing a letter or letters? In so doing you are thanking "the One" who makes all life possible. "The One" who gave Himself to save our lives.

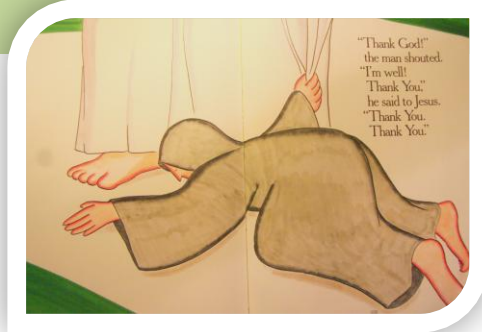

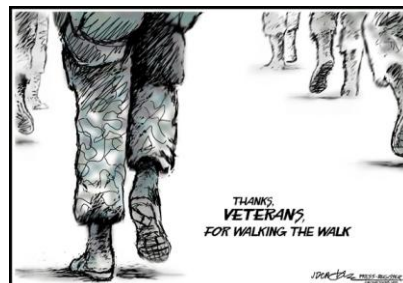

Many thanks are due to our decorators, our musicians, our praying team, the Garfield Churches, and the child care providers for all they did to make our banquet a success. The theme was "ALL HANDS ON DECK" this year - as we all are coming together to get Young Life Staff and activities well supported. Our thanks go in many directions, for making our banquet so wonderful this year. "The food was great," commented one person. One gentleman said, "I didn't know what Young Life was about until I attended the banquet. Now I want to be a part of it."

The banquet hall was filled with live music local teenaged artists, Alex Keeney, Jeff Kent, and Anthony Floyd. Their band's name is the Skyworkers and their instrumental jazz added flavor to the atmosphere. The Garfield Christian Church provided all the flatware and dishes for the event, along with tables and tablecloths. Child care was provided at the Garfield Community Church, and almost 20 children had high quality, loving care while parents attended the banquet. We thank those who cared for our kids including Marie Wallace, Ashley Stewart, Becca Cochran, and Holly Brown!

The banquet meal was served to 116 persons. 22 of them were Young Life teens who were servers at 14 tables. The meal was a colorful nutritious salmon and prime rib dinner with salad, salmon appetizer, cheesy potatoes, asparagus, herbed cheese bread and cheesecake drizzled with berry syrup. Chefs Dean Walker and Dale Tronsen deserve a huge thank you along with the kitchen crew who worked for about 12 hours on this event.

Young Life Area Director Gary Hopkins spoke at the event, along with our local leader, Mark Sawyer. They both have such a heart for building relationships with teens. Tylor Bates was a youth speaker, who spoke about attending Malibu Club in British Columbia and finding great new directions for his life through Christ and the help he is getting from Young Life.

We thank all the participants in our first annual banquet. 14 Table Sponsors stepped up and donated \$100 per table to underwrite the costs of the banquet. A quilt was made by area residents to give away in a drawing along with Young Life t-shirts and water bottles. Many table hosts invited people to attend the banquet, and it was a packed house, at the Garfield school cafeteria. And most of all we thank those who have prayed, and will continue to pray, for Young Life in this area. **PRAYER CHANGES THINGS.** And God hears our prayers. Be diligent, and continue prayer support, along with your financial support for Young Life.

We thank the new donors and those who have set up monthly contributions to Young Life. Many new donors and volunteers are stepping up to make Young Life a reality in the Gar Pal area. We thank our God for making this new life available to our teens. The goal is to reach every student in the Gar Pal high school with the good news of Jesus Christ. We are getting closer to our goal of having 50 people give \$30 a month.... or a dollar a day. It's not too late to join the BUCK UP campaign. The School ~ By Missionary Walt White

We came by mini-van and met three of our staff on a bridge, riding three motorcycles. Because beyond the bridge, the road was impassable for vehicles, we rode on the back the motorcycles. The sky was ominous, and we knew that if the rain came, it would make the dirt road treacherous. I put on my helmet, wondering how much more that would weigh me down if we ended up in the water. Parts of the road had already eroded making it very narrow. We often dismounted while the driver rode or pushed the motorcycles through the muddiest areas. Many places, there was water on both sides and rain was falling to the north and south.

We rode toward the massive Jamuna (Brahmaputra) River for about eight miles. (The Brahmaputra drains most of the northern slope of the Himalayas, as well as huge areas of China and India.) During the flood season, it is a giant, and almost whimsically shifts its course unpredictably. We have had to move one school three times as the river shifted.

First, we visited a school that has been running for several years and the children enthusiastically demonstrated their achievements, reciting Bengali and English poetry. The youngest ones sang or recited nursery rhymes. The pride not just on the faces of the children, but on the faces of the parents and teachers was worth the ride for me!

We backtracked, then turned south to the site of the new school. The local leaders were waiting for us, as well as many of the children who would be attending. We rushed some photographs, as the rain was moving closer. We were introduced to the man that donated the land, and thanked him profusely. The ground had no grass, as it was a low-lying parcel that had to be built up with excavated sandy soil. Construction was not finished, as the ground had to have rains to settle it before construction could begin.

The rain commenced as we began our ride back, but we made it, walking and slipping through the mud when we needed to. Two things stand out from the visit. First, was the great gratitude of the local leaders, parents, teachers and students. The second was the incredible number of children that we passed as we rode. With 3,000 people per square mile, every village needs a school. God bless you at Palouse for providing a school to children that would have no other opportunity to go to school!

(Note: The school has since been finished since Walt's last trip to Bangladesh)

Anyone who is interested in the topic and especially those in teaching roles in the Church

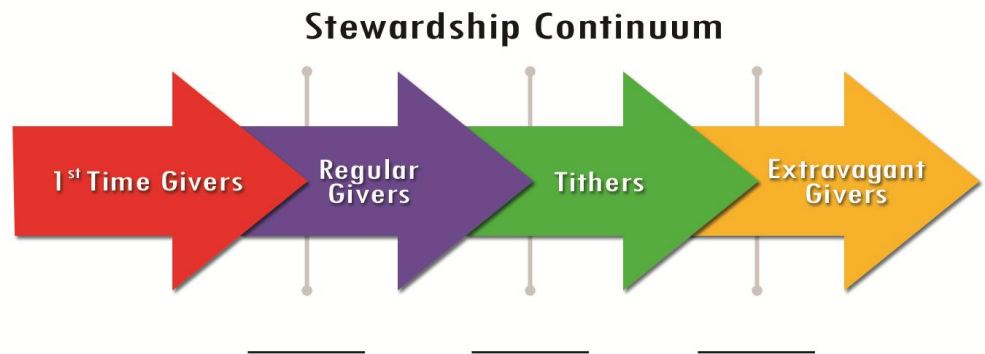

Camping Ministry: Beyond a Single Week in the Summer

There are seasons at church where it may seem that we continually talk about Ross Point Camp and its ministry that reaches our youth. If you are far removed from a summer camp experience, then our stories may sound redundant and long. However, if you have been to a camp lately, you know the joy of seeing Christ break the bondage of sin in the lives of children and teenagers, and it is hard not to speak of the great news! Nothing fulfills my calling as a pastor like seeing lives transformed by Christ and I hope to share this joy. It is a privilege to take part in the discipleship process of nurturing Christians in their journey with Christ, and yet it is a responsibility that I take with serious thought. However summer camp is not ever going to be enough in a child's faith journey to keep them connected and growing. In youth ministry I've seen the impact and momentum a week at Ross Point can give to a young Christian's life but there must be continual encouragement and teaching to keep a teen's life focused on God. We have an opportunity coming up to help ignite the passion and desire to live for Jesus at the Fall Retreat at Ross Point. The dates are **December 2nd-4th** and it is open to all students **6th grade-12th grade**. Brittany and I (Mark) are directing the retreat this year and we hope to have many students come and experience the best. Our theme is "Redefining Popular," based on Jesus' teaching that the first in the world would be last in the kingdom of heaven. Youth Group Fund Raiser

Our desire is to see adults from the church and community volunteer by bringing meals for the teens and tutors, to see adult and older high school students volunteer their time to help students with their homework and assignments. 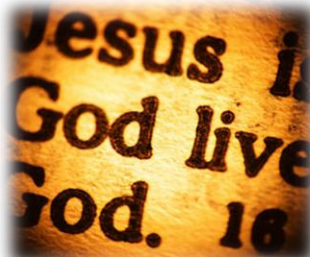

One of the main themes of Psalms is “Giving thanks.” In November we are going to be emphasizing the attitude and action of giving thanks. As you read Psalms, take special note of the Psalms that focus on thanksgiving. This is a rigorous reading month. You may want to break your reading schedule up into morning and evening reading sessions. Or- if you want to only read Psalms that have “thanksgiving” themes, you can scan the Psalms for the words “thanks,” “thankfulness” etc, and read only the Psalms with these themes.
